**London – 15 June 2017:** Learners and tutors from across the UK and around the world have been honoured for their outstanding achievements in professional and technical education at the Lion Awards, a prestigious ceremony hosted by leader in global skills, City & Guilds, at London's iconic Kensington Roof Gardens on Thursday 15 June.

Dubbed the 'Oscars of skills education', the awards showcase the very best in skills talent, recognising outstanding results and progression through learning and training.
